

Lessons learned and mind confused

- Jungle of concepts and definitions:
 - Evaluations, assessments, impacts assessments, appraisals, reviews etc.
- World of intrinsic systems and faculties
 - Science > researchers
 - Administration > policy-planners and –makers
 - Policy > governments and cabinets; decision-makers
 - Evaluation > consultants, contractors
- Gap between the (narrow) methodologies and (broad) fields of assessments: new tools, models and scenarios are needed



Key challenges:

 Create a process which pulls together knowledge (science), strategies (governance), indicators (monitoring) and assessments (analysis)

- Search for an assessment approach where environmental, social and economic perspectives are considered in an integrative / balanced way
- Give guidance to policy-planning: how to manage the long-term goals with uncertain impacts and complexity of the societal challenges
- Add value to the transparent, participatory and futureoriented SD policy-planning tradition
- Help politicians to make justified and sound decisions



Finnish model of Sustainable Development


- Continuity on the political agenda (single 1987)
- Long history of strategies and programmes on SD (since 1990).
- Continuous vertical and horizontal coordination
 - National Commission on Sustainable Development as the main facilitator since 1993
- Leadership on a high political level (Government)
- Institutionalized political dialogue between the government and the stakeholders
- Shared and diversified operational responsibility amongst the Government departments
 - > Towards Governance for Sustainable Development



Assessment scope: Implementation of NSDS 2006

National SD Strategy:

- Defines the strategic SD policy objectives for the government, administration, business and the whole society
- Key guidelines are to be included in the Government and policy programmes
- To be assessed every two years in close linkage with the EU's assessment process
- The FNCSD as a process manager: support concretizing, implementation and evaluation of the objectives of the NSDS







Mainstreaming SD

Strategic level

- Policy coherence: inclusion of SD goals in sector policies
- Permanent Secretary engagement
- Civil society engagement

Operational level

- Implementation of NSDS
- Requirement for ministries and their agencies to draw up organizationspecific SD Action Plans with practical measures (from Green Offices to Sustainable Offices)

Methodological level

- Designing and conducting an assessment process for SD
- Monitoring the trend by indicators; updating & development
- Participating in impact assessment development





According to the NSDS:

- the economic, social and environmental impacts shall be taken into account during the transition to sustainable development
 PROCESS INTEGRATION
- An integrated assessment of the impacts of sustainable development will be applied in the policy programmes and plans resulting from the Strategy
 - > HORIZONTAL INTEGRATION
- A systematic model will be developed to enable assessment of the Strategy's impacts at the national, regional and local levels
 - > VERTICAL INTEGRATION

And according to the EU SDS

 Bridge the gap between science, policy-making and implementation

Process outcome: Evaluation report

- Analysis on the implementation of the objectives of the NSDS as a whole and on a thematic basis
- Assessment on the impacts and on the state of sustainable development in Finland
- Review on the key future challenges and scenarios; recommendations for future steps and priorities
- Introduction of a toolkit for state administration in considering SD targets in their policy-planning



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Expected added value to policy-making

- Increases knowledge on the positive and negative trends as well as critical hot apols
- Increases knowledge on the potential conflicts and synergies across the economic, environmental and social domains
- Contributes to more coherent informed and sustainable planning & decisions across the government departments
- Demonstrates the thematic societal priorities for immediate action and ruture target-setting
- Provides concrete instruments for the sector ministries to mainstream SD into national policy-making
- Encourages the local and other actors to follow the national example
