
Preliminary thoughts how to implement Agenda 2030:

- Discussion on the National Action Plan to implement the Agenda2030 only started in autumn
- Supported by the recently adopted decision by the Government
- Proposal: Action Plan to be adopted by the Parliament12/2016

Many elements and mechanisms in place, but we need for a new approach

Key elements:

- Gap analysis: "Is Finland ready for Agenda 2030".
- Administration's check where we are on/off track, existing processes
- Development Cooperation Policy Programme, to be adopted by 2015
- Administration's (all sectors) policy programmes
- Engagement of civil society and all stakeholders
- Communication plan
- National SD indicator set (Findicator.fi service)
- Society's Commitment to Sustainable development

Strengthened local communities by supporting an active civil society. Pleasant and healthy living environments.




Decision-making that respects nature

So far ~ 160 commitments have been made
